## Baltimore acquires Brown in June rook

William Carey College is known for its successful stulents-great businessmen, outstanding doctors, caring nurses, award-winning playvrights and professional aseball players.

Darrius Brown, outfielder nd pitcher for the Carey Crusaders for two years, eceived his draft to the rooke league of the Baltimore rioles in June.

He has played in 88 ames, serving throughout e season as both outfielder nd pitcher. He was 3-1 with

an ERA of 4.43 and one saved game.

He faced 157 batters and boasts 43 strikeouts. While Brown enjoys the off-season, he anticipates returning to Sarasota, Fla., in March.

"I have always loved to play baseball," Brown said.

Brown, like many ballplayers, began his baseball days at age 5 or 6.

He continued playing ball throughout his high school and college days.

Brown attended D'Iberville High School where he led the Coast pitchers in strikeouts and held the third highest batting average

From high school, Brown went to Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College where he was chosen for the all-star team both years.

Brown comes from a baseball family.

His father, Robert Brown, Sr., played ball in high school and his brother. Robert Brown Jr., now plays for the Red Sox.

During his sophomore year in college, Darrius

Brown knew he, like his brother, wanted to pursue a baseball career.

"I realized baseball was where I needed to be," Brown said.

This realization turned into hard work and this effort paid off for him and for the Crusaders.

Brown played a great role in each game he played.

Play-by-plays from last year invariably mentioned Brown numerous times for

doubles and homers, saves and strikeouts.

Brent St. Germain wrote for The Courier Houma Today after a March 7, 2002, Carey win against Nicholls State, "While miscues helped the Crusaders pull ahead early, they needed late-inning heroics from Darrius Brown to seal the win."
